It may be that as we wait for the celebration of Christ's birth and for his transformational return, we will be gifted with glimpses of divine movement along the way.

Burgos-Núñez, the Superintendent of the Central District in the Greater New Jersey Conference, was elected as Bishop in The United Methodist Church's Northeastern Jurisdictional Conference. With his election, he became the first Hispanic/Latino bishop elected in the jurisdiction. Bishop Burgos' appointment is effective January 1, 2023.

Why are Name Tags Important?

Here are some reasons why it is good to use name tags at church:

1. **Few people know everybody in the church.** Even in the smallest churches, it's sometimes difficult to remember everybody's name. As a church grows, it's even more difficult. Nametags allow us to admit that struggle while providing a way to overcome it.



- Leaders need help with names. Our leaders want to know everybody's name in church, but are not normally gifted with that kind of memory. They would much prefer calling people by name as they minister to them – and nametags allow them to do so.
- 3. **Nametags invite conversation.** Knowing another person's name breaks down one barrier to conversations that church folks ought to feel comfortable having. It's simply easier to talk with others when you are on a first-name basis.
- 4. **Knowing names makes fellowship more personal.** While calling each other "brother" or "sister" sounds good (and is theologically on target), that nomenclature is often a cover up for "I'm sorry I don't know your name, and I'm embarrassed to ask." As long as conversations remain at the anonymous "brother" and "sister" level, fellowship will remain surface level.
- 5. **Nametags save embarrassment.** We've probably all called someone by the wrong name, only to realize it later (or perhaps even within the same conversation). If "*brother*" or "*sister*" is a gentle way of saying, "*I don't know your name,*" using the wrong name is an undeniable way of doing so. That's embarrassing for both parties.



Getting to Know our Congregation Members

In our busy lives, it's easy to take for granted the impact of technology and innovation that has come out of the Greater Binghamton/Southern Tier Region of New York. Over the last several decades, we have experienced an evolution in technology that has been driven by entrepreneurial management leadership and hardworking, dedicated employees. We have witnessed the family-oriented/employee -focused management approach of the Johnson family that made Endicott Johnson one of the largest shoe manufacturers in the world. Ed Link made Binghamton the birthplace for aerospace simulation and pilot training. Thomas Watson created IBM into the leader in computer technology ... an essential part

of our daily lives. Currently, we have companies such as the Raymond Corporation, BAE System, Lockheed Martin, Universal Instruments and many other local businesses that have contribute to this evolution. The TechWorks! in Binghamton is a working museum that highlights innovation of the past, present, and future.

What's next? Well, if all goes to plan, our area's next technological contribution will involve Lithium-Ion battery manufacturing and the Southern Tier becoming the Center of Competence for battery technology.

In the October Nimmonsburg Witness, we told you about the career of one of our congregation members, Gene Abbey, and his contribution to Link Aviation and manned-spaceflight. This month, we would like to inform you of another member of our church who has had an exciting career in manufacturing automation... worldwide... and most recently coordinated the effort to bring the future of battery manufacturing to our area.

On Thursday November 17th our congregation member, **Dennis Lockhart**, was the speaker at the November Professional Development Meeting of the Binghamton Chapter of American Society for Quality (ASQ). The meting was held at TechWorks! on Water Street in Binghamton. Dennis reviewed examples of manufacturing automation projects he has coordinated during his exciting career at Universal Instruments in Binghamton and his subsequent work as owner and primary consultant for CIMSEE Consulting, LLC, also of Binghamton. During his career, Dennis has coordinated over 130 worldwide projects as a Senior Systems Project Manager and Industrial Engineering Project Leader.

Did you know..... Dennis developed the largest Chinese television manufacturing plant in Chengdu, China with 183 automated manufacturing cells for the manufacture of printed circuit boards and semi-automated final assembly? Another project for the DSS TV satellite manufacturing facility in Juarez, Mexico yielded 10 fully-automated production lines... each 1,100 ft. long in a 1.3 million sq. ft. facility. It involved 127 tractor trailer loads of robotics, automation cells, materials handling

equipment, test equipment, computers, and facility support equipment. And, these are just a handful of his projects!

Dennis has coordinated projects for important companies including Ford, Chrysler, General Motors, Bosch, Apple, IBM, AT&T, Genie, GE, Samsung, LG, Whirlpool, Motorola and many others.

The highlight of the ASQ presentation was an account of the 9 month-long project to relocate a 2.3 million sq. ft Lithium-Ion battery manufacturing facility from Concord, NC to the Huron Campus (former IBM site) in Endicott, NY. The move to establish the Iperium3 New York (iM3NY) Lithiam-Ion battery plant also involved approximately 120 trailer loads of equipment, and required the complete renovation of the former IBM materials distribution center building. The massive, new, high-tech facility occupies a space equivalent to the size of 3 football fields.
