National Chili Day—February 23, 2023



On February 23rd, the United States will be celebrating “**National Chili Day**” - a day to pay homage to the legendary dish that brings people together, AND can tear them apart. There are many heated arguments over chili, as people can be very passionate about their chili recipes. Some of the most common arguments in the “*great chili debate*” revolve around what type of meat to use, what beans to include and whether or not to add tomatoes. Maybe that is why chili is the ultimate “cook-off” dish! *Where do you stand in the great chili debate?* Most food historians, among them chili expert Frank X. Tobert, author of the classic, **A Bowl of Red**, agree that chili likely originated in Texas.

Chili

Ingredients:

Small amount of Oil	1/8 t. Chili Powder
1½ lbs. Ground Beef	1 medium Onion
1½ t. crushed Red Pepper	2 cups Water
1 (12 oz.) can Tomatoes	1 1/8 t. Cumin
1 1/8 t. Salt	3/4 t. White Pepper
3/4 t. Garlic Powder	2 Beef Bouillon
2 (12 oz.) cans Kidney Beans	

Saute onions in oil. Add meat and cook until browned. Add spices while sauteing. Then add tomatoes, kidney beans, water and bouillon cubes. Simmer for one hour. Enjoy!! (You can reduce red pepper for a milder chili.)



A Note from Pastor Alicia

Hello, Nimmonsburg! I'm Rev. Alicia (uh-lee-c-uh) Dixon-Garrard (soft "g"), and I wanted to tell you a little about myself. I grew up downstate in Westchester County and came to the area to study at Binghamton University. I met my husband here at a local church. We both have been in Binghamton for thirty years now, and will be celebrating our twentieth anniversary in May.

Pastor Harold Wheat and I became friends a few years ago while I was a chaplain at a local nursing home. One of the members of his church resided at the home and needed his pastoral care. We stayed in touched even after I transitioned out of that position since we shared common interest in deep study, spiritual formation, and social justice.

I am ordained in the American Baptist tradition, and attended Northeastern Seminary in Rochester for my Masters of Divinity. Unlike Southern and Independent Baptists, American Baptists have embraced women preaching and in the pastorate. Lucky for me! Two key differences between Methodists and Baptists are in roots and polity. Most Baptists adhere more to John Calvin's theology whereas Methodist call John Wesley their theological father. Also, Baptists practice congregationalism which means that each church acts autonomously.

In spite of those variations, I have long enjoyed being ecumenical and flexible. I enjoy preaching cross-denominationally, visiting new churches, and making friends of diverse backgrounds. Some of my ministry experience includes children and youth ministry, chaplaincy with the elderly, heading Christian education and discipleship, and serving as an associate pastor. Every assignment blessed me with the opportunity to walk with people on their faith journey.

I was quite honored when Pastor Harold asked me to preach and help care for this congregation during his absence. I was available to help because I was not on staff at a church at the time. Pulpit supply had kept me busy, but I was free to fill in.

You all have been so welcoming and patient. I have appreciated your openness to my presence and preaching. It can be hard to adjust to the new and unknown. Yet, you have done so with grace.

I am certain that Pastor Harold is looking forward to his return. Though I won't see you regularly once he is back, I will keep you in my prayers as you move forward with your wonderful under-shepherd.

Please keep me in your prayers, as well. I will be starting a new position on March 1, 2023. I am excited about my new job. Yet, I will remember you and think of you fondly.

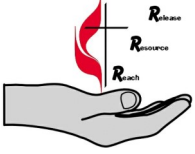
