Stress! Do you have stress? I do too! Where does stress come from? Stress has many sources, but one thing is for certain - if you are worried about something, it causes stress.

The Bible tells us (in Matthew 6:25-34) that we should not worry. I cannot say it any better than Jesus did, "*Therefore, I say* to you, don't worry about your life, what you'll eat or what you'll drink, or about your body, what you'll wear. Isn't life more than food and the body more than clothes? Look



at the birds in the sky. They don't sow seed or harvest grain or gather crops into barns. Yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Aren't you worth much more than they are? Who among you by worrying can add a single moment to your life? And why do you worry about clothes? Notice how the lilies in the field grow. They don't wear themselves out with work, and they don't spin cloth. But I say to you that even Solomon in all of his splendor wasn't dressed like one of these. If God dresses grass in the field so beautifully, even though it's alive today and tomorrow it's thrown into the furnace, won't God do much more for you, you people of weak faith? Therefore, don't worry and say, 'What are we going to eat?' or 'What are we going to drink?' or 'What are we going to wear?' Gentiles long for all these things. Your heavenly Father knows that you need them. Instead, desire first and foremost God's kingdom and God's righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. Therefore, stop worrying about tomorrow, because tomorrow will worry about itself. Each day has enough trouble of its own."

What are you worried about today? What has become a source of stress in your life? Over and over, in the Bible, we are told not to worry and do not be afraid. God, who made us, loves us, cares, and provides for us, is able to protect and guide us. There are many things in this world that we do not know, but one thing is for certain – God is able!

Recalibration #3

At our third Recalibration Dinner, we had fourteen people, and we talked about how to engage people in the life of our church. How do we help people get involved in worship, community, spiritual practices, generosity and service, and



Christ-likeness? How do we engage newcomers, as well as those who have been here *"forever"*?

This process is called Intentional Discipleship, and it is part of our Methodist heritage. John Wesley did this through societies, classes and bands.

The biggest quote of the night was: *"Intentional Discipleship begins when authentic leaders model what it means to be a growing maturing disciple."* If the leaders of the church are not modeling healthy discipleship, we cannot expect anyone else to do it.

Apply Now for Endowment Funds

Requests for Church Endowment Funds are now being accepted through May 1, 2022. Requests should be submitted in writing to either Rex Decker, Chairman, Russ Sanaeko or Cheryl Weeks. Requests should include the date,

committee or person requesting funds, amount requested, date needed, and a brief description as to how the funds will be used. These funds will be distributed in the following four categories: (1) Special Needs; (2) General Expense; (3) Building and Maintenance and (4) Missions.

This year we have \$1,057.93 available to spend on each of the four categories. In addition, we did not spend anything last year for Special Needs, General Expense, and Building and Maintenance. Therefore, the amounts available this year are:

(1) Special Needs-\$1,839.55
(2) General Expense-\$1,839.55
(3) Building and Maintenance-\$1,839.55
(4) Missions-\$1,057.93

After the May 1st deadline, the Endowment Fund Committee will submit recommendations to the Administrative Board. The Administrative Board's decisions will be put into writing and sent to the person or committee which made the requests.

As soon as I saw this recipe, I wanted to make it. BUT, I decided to wait until I have some company to share it with. (*I might be tempted to eat more than I should!*) This recipe was submitted to our Church Cookbook by Corrine Abbey.

1 cup Sour Cream

1/2 cup Mayonnaise

Vegetable Pizza

Ingredients:

1 pkg. (dry) Hidden Valley Ranch Dressing Mix

- 8 oz. pkg. Cream Cheese
- 2 pkgs. Crescent Rolls
- 2 cups each of the following vegetables:

Broccoli, cauliflower, onions, carrots and tomatoes (*or use Verdelli fresh* Salad mix which can be found in the Produce Dept. of your grocery store)

- 1. Spread crescent rolls on two cookie sheets
- 2. Bake 375° for 10 minutes.
- 3. Soften cream cheese; mix with mayonnaise, sour cream and dressing mix. Spread on rolls.
- 4. Chop up vegetables and sprinkle over coated rolls. Press down.
- 5. Refrigerate until cold, and cut into squares.

Did we miss your special day? If so, please let us know so we can celebrate with you!

Dear Nimmonsburg Family,

So many of you have expressed concern and asked questions about my surgery. Because it was unusual and interesting, I thought some of you might be interested in what exactly it entailed. I was diagnosed with Avascular *Necrosis. Simply put, my wrist bone was dying because* it was not being fed the blood needed from the veins. Unless it was fixed, it would continue to progress and my bone would eventually die. It's an uncommon disease (Kienbocks Disease) and a rare surgery, and usually occurs because of a past injury or for no apparent I'm assuming that is my case as I don't reason. remember a past injury.

My orthopedic hand doctor never did the surgery and he did not know of another in Binghamton that could do it. He referred me to a hand surgeon in Syracuse. The surgery involved cutting out a 2mm section of the bone and putting it back together with a screw. Eventually it will heal back together as broken bones do. I need to wear a soft cast given to responsible adults only for 5 weeks. (I quess they assume I was one!)

It has been amazingly painless since surgery. My wrist will return to 100% usage after 5 weeks of casting and a couple of months of therapy to get back my range of motion. I wanted to share this information because I found the condition interesting and it's good to know as much as you can in case any of you should encounter the same thing.

What Has He Been Up To?




Have you noticed how nice the church kitchen is looking lately? Gene Abbey has been quietly painting the walls and the ceiling, and it looks great.

What is Lent and Why Does it Last for 40 Days?

Lent is a season of (40) forty days, not counting Sundays, which begins on Ash Wednesday and ends on Holy Saturday. Lent comes from the Anglo Saxon word lencten. meaning "lengthen" and refers to the lengthening days of The forty spring. days represents the time Jesus in the wilderness, spent enduring the temptation of Satan and preparing to begin his ministry.

Lent is a time of repentance, <u>fasting</u> and preparation for the coming of Easter. It is a time of self-examination and reflection. In the early church, Lent began as a period of fasting and preparation for baptism by new converts and then became a time of penance by all Christians. Today. Christians focus on relationship with God, growing as disciples and extending ourselves, often choosing to give up something or to volunteer and give of ourselves for others.

Sundays in Lent are not counted in the forty days because each Sunday "mini-Easter." represents a This is why you will see the designation "Sunday in Lent" rather than "Sunday of Lent" of these in the naming Sundays. On each Lord's Day in Lent, while Lenten fasts continue, the reverent spirit of Lent is tempered with joyful anticipation of the Resurrection.
