Preparing for Easter

The paradox of celebrating the Resurrection of Jesus Christ as an annual holiday is that we end up pretending for 40 days that we don't know what is coming. The first disciples didn't even know that they had clues. Jesus' hints and prophesies didn't make sense to them until after he appeared among them and started explaining it all. For us, Easter celebrations happen once a year. For them, the finality of death had spoken and they could not imagine there was more to say. It is good for us to



remember that as we encounter the forces of death within and around us because death still claims to have the last word. And, even though we know the outcome of the Easter story, we are human. Our encounters with grief and death may be as unpredictable for us as the death of Jesus was for the first disciples. Our lives may require of us the kind of trust and vulnerability that led Thomas to ask to touch Jesus, or led Peter into a moment when Jesus allowed him to confess his love again, and again.

So whatever you have chosen as a practice to deepen your love of God, do that knowing that your devotion may become the lifeline God uses to save you from an encounter with the forces of death on Good Friday. The story of God's Son had a Good Friday chapter, but Sunday's coming. And won't there be joy on Easter morning?

Easter Salad (Samantha Skaggs/Five Heart Home)

Easter Salad (or Strawberry Goat Cheese Salad with Toasted Almonds & Lemon Honey Vinaigrette) is a delicious addition to Easter dinner, or any spring or summer meal! It features sweet strawberries, creamy goat cheese, and toasted almonds on a bed of mixed greens drizzled with Lemon Honey Vinaigrette!

Ingredients:

l cup slivered almonds 16 oz. strawberries (washed and sliced)

12 oz. mixed spring greens 4 oz. crumbled goat cheese

Lemon Honey Vinaigrette:

1/2 c. sunflower, safflower or olive oil 2 T. honey Freshly ground black pepper (to taste) 5 T. freshly squeezed lemon juice 1/4 t. sea salt (or more to taste) 1 t. poppy seeds (optional)

Instructions:

- 1. Adjust rack to center, and preheat oven to 350° . Spread slivered almonds on sheet pan and bake 5-7 minutes or until fragrant and light brown. Cool.
- 2. To prepare vinaigrette, measure all ingredients into a Mason jar. Tightly screw on lid and shake vigorously until thoroughly combined. (Or use blender or whisk)
- 3. To assemble the salad, layer the mixed greens, sliced strawberries, toasted slivered almonds and crumbled goat cheese in a large bowl. Just before serving, dress with your desired amount of Lemon Honey Vinaigrette and toss until evenly coated.

Note: If you don't care for goat cheese, use crumbled feta or blue cheese instead.

Women's History Month

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH



Women's History Month is dedicated to the many accomplishments and achievements of women in US history that are often overlooked.

In 1980, President Jimmy Carter declared the week of March 8 to be National Women's History Week, urging everyone in the United States to participate. According to Carter:

"too often the women were unsung and sometimes their contributions went unnoticed. But the achievements, leadership, courage, strength, and love of the women who built America was as vital as that of the men whose names we know so well."

This week-long event officially became a month-long one in 1987 when Congress passed a resolution designating March as **Women's History Month**. Women's History Month has been celebrated in the United States every March since.

Some simple ways that you can observe Women's History Month include:

- 1. <u>Watch a documentary about women's rights</u>.
- 2. <u>Read books about women's rights</u>.
- 3. <u>Put it in writing</u>. Think of a woman you look up to and admire. Write her a letter describing the impact she has/had on your life.
- 4. <u>Have a girl's lunch</u>. Lunch, breakfast, dinner—it doesn't matter.
- 5. <u>Study up on Women's History</u>. There are some excellent museums dedicated entirely to the accomplishments of women.

"The success of every woman should be the inspiration to another. We should raise each other up. Make sure you're very courageous: be strong, be extremely kind, and above all be humble," said Serena Williams.
